



# History of U.S. Immigration - 1

- The Colonial Period: Largely undocumented
- Prior to 1800: More immigrants arrived at Philadelphia than at
- 1800: Beginning of Federal Passenger Arrival Records but minimal compliance
  - · Baggage Lists at Port of Philadelphia
  - New Orleans 1813 & 1815
  - Alexandria, VA (very spotty)
- Pre- 1820: Estimated 650,000 individuals arrived in America, (60 percent were English and Welsh)
- 1819: Congress enacts law requiring passenger lists to combat overcrowding and victimizing immigrants. Lists include age, sex, occupation and country of origin



# History of U.S. Immigration - 2

- 1820-1880: About ten million immigrants most from northern Europe, the British Isles, and Scandinavia
- 1840-1850: Dramatic increase in the number of immigrants from Germany and Ireland
- 1847: Nine percent of passengers headed to U.S. died
  - State of New York converts Castle Garden into receiving station to protect immigrants from swindlers
- 1880-1900: Nine million immigrants entered U.S. which was largest number in any 20 year period
- 1886: "The Statue of Liberty Enlightening the World" was a gift of friendship from the people of France to the United States and is recognized as a universal symbol of freedom and democracy



## History of U.S. Immigration - 3

- 1880-1920: More than twenty-five million immigrants, primarily from southern and eastern Europe,
  - The largest numbers (in order) came from Germany, Italy, Ireland, Austria-Hungary, Russia, and England
  - Many of these immigrants settled in the larger cities, including New York City, Chicago, and Philadelphia
- 1890: U.S. Treasury Department assumes control of immigration
- 1892: Ellis Island opens in New York harbor
- 1892-1924: Twenty million to U.S. (71% through NY)
- 1925-1954: Over four million (56% through NY)
- 12 Nov 1954: Ellis Island closed

1870-French names looked German; 1900- 90 Bohemians; Austria included 10 Poles and Germany / Prussia included 162 Poles.

## **More Population Notes**

- It is difficult to get precise numbers for each area using the Ancestry.com 1870 census search engine. They all get lumped together as German even though there is a more specific description of their place of birth.
- "The German-born population, which settled mainly on prairie lands in the western part of the county, grew from slightly over 1,000 in 1860 to almost 3,500 in 1890, when one in four residents of Washington County was of German extraction."

## German Chain Migration & Settlements Washington Co.


- stemwedegenealogy.com
  - villages in the parishes of Levern, Wehdem, Oppenwehe and Dielingen were combined
  - Stemwede Emigrant Database -168 matches for Brenham
- Rehburg founded by German immigrants in 1847 and named for Rehburg, Hannover
- Others: Berlin, Latium, Salem, Greenvine, & Gay Hill
- 1873 1919: German newspaper Texas Volksbote was published in Brenham.



# Customs Passenger Lists, 1820 to circa 1891

- Proof of arrival of 20 million people
- Intended to avoid overcrowding and improve health
- Name, age, sex and occupation
- Lists kept by Customs Collectors at ports
- Copies sent to State Department
- Natl. Archives microfilmed in 1977
- Originals at Temple University

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# Mr. & Mrs. Henry Eichholt

- The first Germans to locate permanently in Washington County
- Henry was born in Brocken near Berlin
- Arrived at Washington Spring 1846
- Married Louise Roehling in 1847





# Immigration of Henry Eicholt

- WC History by Pennington 1915 said he was born in Brocken near Berlin & he arrived at Washington 1846
- 1900 Census says he arrived in 1846 and he was naturalized but no date is given
- He was not found in <u>GHF Immigration Database</u> under EICHOLT or EICHHOLT or ECKOLT or EIC\* or ECK\*; GHF-ID not browseable
- Should search <u>New Orleans & New York lists</u>
- Look for <u>naturalization in Washington County</u>

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





# About Texas, Naturalization Records, 1881-1992 Generally speaking, most pre-1906 naturalization papers contain little information of biographical or genealogical value. In the absence of standardized naturalization forms, federal, state, county, and other minor courts of record created their own naturalization documents, which varied greatly in format. There are, however, wonderful exceptions, so it is worth seeking pre-1906 naturalizations. Records created after 1906 usually contain significant genealogical information and are often worth the search to locate them. To Learn More: Much of the above information was taken from: Loretto D. 




Passenger Arrival Records
Many people who moved to Texas originally arrived in the United States at the port of New Orleans. The National Archives and the Family History Library have passenger lists for New Orleans dating from 1820 to 1921, with indexes to 1952.

Galveston passenger lists from 1846 to 1871, 1896 to 1921, and index 1896-1951 are available at the National Archives and FHL film 830233, and are indexed in two sources:

Ships Passenger Lists, Port of Galveston, Texas, 1846-1871. Easley, South Carolina: Southern Historical Press, 1984. FHL book 976.4139/G1 W3s.

Blaha, Albert J. Passenger Lists for Galveston, 1850-1855. [Houston, Texas: A.J. Blaha], 1985. FHL book 976.4139/G1 W3b and FHL fiche 6099940. This includes some Indianola arrivals.

### Unable to Find Your Ancestor?

- Check for variant spellings and transcription errors
- Use soundex, wildcards, begins with, etc.
- Try a different index if there is one for the years needed
- Search the indexes of other port cities
- Browse the passenger lists by year or ship


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### Ellis Island period

- Extract Forms -Blank forms for extracting information from a List or Manifest of Alien Passengers for the US Immigration Office at Port of Arrival. From Capital Area Genealogical Society. (www.cyndislist.com/ships/general/)
- 1893-1906 22 lines
- 1907-1918 29 lines
- 1919-1925 33 lines
- Post 1925 36 lines
- Many passenger list forms (esp. 20<sup>th</sup> Cen.) were two pages long. Click "Previous" and "Next" to see all pertinent images
