LUSK'S HALL, BRENHAM, TEXAS, Oct. 26, 1899.

The meeting was called to order by Hon. D. C. Giddings, Jr., at 11:30 a. m., who stated the objects of the convention, which were in pursuance to the following call, issued April 1st, 1899.

"A meeting of all the people along the Brazos valley and others interested in the work of making the Brazos a navigable stream has been discussed for some time in the public press and by private correspondence, and from public and private expressions it is clear that a meeting so full of magnificent possibilities is desirable. Arrangements are being rapidly perfected to raise a monument to mark the spot in Washington where the declaration of Texas independence was signed, March 2, 1836, and the suggestion has been made that the meeting to consider the navigation of the Brazos be held at that time, in that place, but as the unveiling ceremonies will necessarily consume

that place, out as the unveiling ceremonies will necessarily consume the entire day; therefore be it

"RESOLVED by the citizens of Brenham, in mass meeting assembled, that a conference for the purpose above expressed be called to meet in Brenham, Texas, July 3, 1899, at 11 o'clock.

"RESOLVED, That we most respectfully suggest that city councils, boards of trade, chambers of commerce, business leagues, cotton exchanges or other business organizations appoint delegates to said meeting, and where there are no such organizations the people come

exchanges or other business organizations appoint delegates to said meeting, and where there are no such organizations the people come together in mass meeting and elect delegates.

"RESOLVED, That no meeting held in recent years in this part of Texas is so fraught with grand possibilities, and every county in the Brazos valley is urged to send representatives.

"RESOLVED, That Brenham is accessible by rail from every point in the valley, centrally located, with ample hall and hotel accommodations, and will welcome most cordially all who may attend this important meeting."

Rev. James Nobles, rector of St. Peter's church, invoked the blessings of Almighty God on the proceedings of the convention.

Col. D. C. Giddings; the man who, while a member of congress, secured the first appropriation from the general government for improving the Brazos River, welcomed the visiting delegates in the name of the hospitable inhabitants of Brenham, its officials, and touched upon the imperative necessity for opening to navigation the waterways of Texas and declared that the present movement was the entering wedge for transportation competition, the only influence that can regulate freight rates in the interest of the people. The speaker called attention to the fact that the existence of the Brazos River had been amply advertised by the recent flood. No question would be asked, when congress came to consider an appropriation for its improvement. The consultation of maps and the study of geography by members from other states. in order to locate this stream, had been obviated by the attention which the raging waters of the turbid stream attracted throughout the entire country early in July.

The cordial welcome extended by Col. Giddings was replied to by the Hon. Joe Duff, of Angleton. He stated that every undeveloped river in Texas was a direct tax on the producer of the country tributary to it. The delegates to this convention, the speaker said, represent a territory larger than most of the states of the American union, and the influence of the opening to navigation the river that drains this territory, will go to every individual who produces anything. The speaker introduced figures to show that 500,000 bales of cotton are produced in the twelve counties contiguous to the Brazos. He would not attempt to estimate the saving which would be made in this cotton alone by securing water rates. The speaker then turned to and congratulated the chairman, Col. Giddings, on the certainty of, in the near future, the full accomplishment of the dream of life. "To you, sir," he said, "who are now slowly descending to the western slope of time, and have devoted the strength of your manhood to the development of the best interests of Texas, and to whose sound judgment this great measure is indebted for its first national recognition, this gathering here today of representative men bent upon the accomplishment of this enterprise, must be a great source of satisfaction and happiness. As Texans, in the battles of life borrowing their strength from the approving smile of woman, have never failed in the past, this convention, being surrounded by that same source of inspira-

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tion, will not fail in this fight. 'In the name of the delegates, I thank the ladies for their presence, and the good people of Brenham for their hearty welcome."

Following this address permanent organization was effected by the election of Hon. L. L. Foster, of Bryan, chairman, and Hon. D. C. Giddings, Jr., secretary. Mr. Foster made a brief address, beginning with the statement that the navigation of the Brazos River was the most important subject that had engaged the people of Texas since the organization of the state. Continuing, Mr. Foster said he would repeat a statement that he had made on a former occasion, viz: That if the Brazos River was located in any state north of the Mason and Dixon line it would years ago have been navigated from Waco to Velasco. A motion to adjourn until 2 o'clock p. m. then prevailed.

At the afternoon session Mr. Giddings resigned as secretary after thanking the convention for the honor. J. L. Bates, of Brazoria, was elected to succeed him.

A program committee was then appointed, consisting of D. C. Giddings, L. R. Bryan and Clarence Ousley.

The report of Judge John M. Lyle, of Waco, was submitted to the convention as follows:

WACO, TEXAS, October 25, 1899.

To the Chairman of the Convention on the improvement of the Brazos River held at Brennam, Texas.

SIR:—At a convention of the delegates from the counties on the Brazos River, to further its improvement for navigation, held in the city of Waco, Texas, on the 1st of February, 1893, the undersigned was appointed chairman of the committee that was given charge of the whole subject matter. It has been suggested by friends of the enterprise that it would be beneficial for him to make a report to your convention and he respectfully submits the following:

Prior to 1893, acting for the undersigned as chairman of a committee of the Board of Trade for the city of Waco, Prof. J. H. Hurwood made a careful examination of the river from Waco to Richmond and submitted a detailed report of the work, and it is herewith submitted.

Through the late Senator Richard Coke, an appropriation was secured from the United States congress for a preliminary survey of the stream by engineers of the government.

The convention of February 1, 1893, above mentioned, decided on the

The convention of February 1, 1895, above mentioned, decided on the following plan of operation and directed its execution by the committee: 1.—That the enterprise be carried out by a private corporation incorporated under the laws of Texas, and that the company enter into a contract with the government of the United States, by which the improvement should be taken off its hands at cost.

2.—To secure funds to make a complete survey of the river to tide water, with the necessary statistics of the counties along the river as to production and as to merchandise imported and exported.

3.—To engage competent attorners to prepare and present to the legislature such amendments to the state law as should be necessary.

The committee on legislation, consisting of Hons. Branch T. Masterson, of Galveston, and R. H. Harrison, of Waco, memorialized the legislature of the State of Texas, and a copy of the memorial is herewith submitted. The legislature refused the legislation.

The money panic that followed immediately on the heels of the

convention rendered it impossible to raise funds.

Without needed legislation and money my committee was unable to carry out the plans of the convention, and turned its efforts toward getting the survey made by the United States engineers, provided for in the appropriation secured by Senator Coke. After so long a time to-wit: In January, 1895, an assistant engineer, S. W. Campbell, arrived in Waco and made the examination of the river. His report is below it to support the submitted to the state of the sta herewith submitted.

At the solicitation of the committee, the commercial club of Waco employed Mr. John Wilson, a competent engineer, to collect statistics of the counties along the river and make a map of the counties in the Brazos valley below Waco to accompany the district engineer's report to Washington. Other counties aided materially in this expense. The result of Mr. Wilson's labors will be found in the copy of his report herewith submitted. His map was forwarded to the district engineer

at Galveston, and no copy was retained.

Major A. M. Miller, chief of engineers at Galveston, made a report to Washington based on Engineer Campbell's examination of the river. In this report he says: "The only method of improving this stream, (the Brazos) to admit of low water navigation, would be by means of locks and dams. The fall from Waco to Richmond is over 300 feet, and this method of improvement would require an expenditure of probably \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000."

This was based on Campbell's report, after a hurried passage over the river, and who says in his report: "From only a preliminary examina-

tion the length of shoals and the height of falls were only approximately obtained. The river was found to be at an unusually low stage, said to be the lowest for 30 years, due to the long drouth of six or eight

The only official examination of the river worthy of the name was made in 1874 by Captain Talfor. He used instruments and spent several months in the work. Yet his estimate of length of shoals, height of falls and current are reported as only approximate. He too, mentions the fact of the extreme low stage of the water at the time of his survey—midsummer. He says: "From personal observation, I think that the navigation of the Brazos to Washington can be accomplished at a stage of river, at, say i full; to Richmond and San Felipe at even a less stage of water, but as to the duration of the above stages of water, I am not informed."

Major Allen, chief of engineers at Galveston, in his report of February 24, 1891, takes Captain Talfor's report and without entering into calculations, he says: "To overcome the obstructions to low water navigation presented by the rocks and boulder shoals, a system of locks and dams would be required, the cost of which would be out of all proportion to the present commerce of the river. As for the prospective commerce of the stream or that which might be developed by an expensive improvement the indications are too vague and uncertain. I

am therefore of the opinion, that this river should not now be classed as amongst those worthy of improvement by the government."

The information as to statistics given to the government in all these reports is meagre. Major Allen cites the chief of engineers report for 1896, as showing the commerce of the river to be \$136.508. and Tallor's reserved in the subject. Produce seeking the Gulf of Mexico by water from the Brazos River and vica versa must therefore pass through channels controlled by private corporations."—It will be observed by Mr. Bryan's paper that the government now has full charge of the mouth of the river, which is being improved by the government.

As to whether these objections to the improvement of the river, last mentioned by Major Allen, at government expense, would be serious in

the eyes of congress this committee has no information.

From these reports it appears that the river can be made navigable. The only question is one of cost. Major Miller says it will cost from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000. He also says that at the time of his report the commerce to be accommodated did not justify the expense of the improvement.

Engineer Wisner, who built the jetties at the mouth of the river, says in a lettar to the Board of Trade of the city of Velasco, herewith submitted, that taking Prof. Hurwood's report as a basis of calculation, the work can be done for \$1,500,000 and by a calculation based on Captain Talfor's report \$2,500,000. These estimates provide for a good

profit to a contractor.

Is the game worth the candle? Is the only question to be solved by your convention. If permitted to suggest to your honorable body, my experience leads me to say: Appoint a good executive committee, with power to raise funds to have the cost of the work estimated by a reputable hydraulic engineer, which Mr. Wisner says will cost only \$2,000; to procure statistics to convince congress that the commerce to excommodeted justifies the outlay; and to present the facts to congress in a way that will be effective. It can be shown that even at Major Miller's high estimate, the saving in freight charges on commerce would repay the cost in a few years.

As a result of the agitation of this subject, I am glad to report that an appropriation has already been made by congress to improve the Brazos to Richmond. But no work has yet been done, as the committee had no money to look after the matter. The engineers in this district have more improvements on their hands than they can attend to, and those that have not friends to urge them upon their attention are neglected. This appropriation is coupled with West Galveston bay, Double bayou, and the mouth of adjacent streams and although the appropriation was made in 1895, it was exhausted on these improvements and none left for the Brazos.

While the committee was preparing resolutions speeches were made by Senator Chilton, Congressman Ball, and Railroad Commissioner Storey:

ADDRESS BY L. R. BRYAN.

In discussing the subject of making the Brazos river navigable from its mouth to Waco, we must be able to successfully maintain the following propositions: That a channel of at least four feet can be gotten and maintained.
 That this can be done at a reasonable cost.

3.—That the benefit to the public resulting from the necessary expenditure will justify the government in making that expenditure.
4.—That we have such facts as will influence congress to make the

necessary appropriation.

1. Addressing ourselves to the first proposition, viz: "that a channel of at least four feet in depth can be gotten and maintained," it might be well to state that this depth is ample for the accommodation of flat bottom or river boats. Boats like the Whitewater, Alice Blair and Hiawatha, which plied in the lower Brazos from Columbia down during the years 1890, 1891 and 1892, carried 800 to 1000 bales of cotton and other freight, drawing less than three feet. When we are called upon in the ordinary affairs of life to act upon something that is new to us, we first ask whether the same thing has been tried elsewhere, and if so, with what success? If it has been successful elsewhere, we then inquire whether the same principle can be applied to the present state of facts in our case? If we find that the same principles have been applied in other cases wherein the facts were similar to those in our case, and if we find that those men who are experts in that particular line of business believe that success can be had in our case, and these opinions of experts are supported by the opinions of practical business men who have seen similar works a success in other parts of the world, we are surely justified in concluding that we, too, can make a success in our undertaking. Everyone knows that it is a physical possibility to actually dig a canal from the gull shore to Waco, though at a great cost of money. The proposition we have before us is: Can we take advantage of the excavation already made by nature and utilize the channel of the Brazos river so that the cost of making a low water channel of at least four feet in depth from Velasco to Waco will be justified? There are two characteristics of the Brazos river which, in the opinion of engineers and those familiar with such work render the Brazos river easily susceptible of improvement. One is, the river is a chain of lakesor pools with ample depth of water in them at nearly all seasons of the year for our purpose the shallow places being the shoals, or rapids, or falls, as they are variously, called over which the upper lake or stretch of river falls into the lake or stretch immediately below it. These are the steps by which the river gradually descends to the gulf. The other characteristic of the river is, the soil underlying it is of a tenacious clay which does not wash easily, and therefore there are few; if any, quicksands to contend with. This clay formation causes the river to cut a deep rather than a wide channel, similar to the channel cut through rock. Now, let us take up the actual facts of history concerning the navigation of the Brazos river in the past without the aid of engineering skill, and also inquire what are the opinions of engineers. and men who have given the matter thoughtful consideration, and see whether other rivers have not likewise been improved as we desire the Brazos to be. The Brazos river has been navigated. It is a fact known to many men now living that from 1835 to 1860 steambouts navigated the river regularly as far up as old Washington, opposite; Navasota, and some time went as high up as Port Sullivan, sixty miles? above Washington. I have withing the bills of lading issued in 1849 and 1850 to Hon. John Adriance of Columbia by the steamers Washington, Jack Have and General Hamer." Colonel Adriance was in business in Columbia from 1834 to 1860 and happened to find these bills among his old papers. The first bill of lading is a shipment by the stemeer Wash-i

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Ington to the town of Washington. It is a historical fact that the steamer Yellowstone went up to San Felipe, and in March, 1836, aided in carrying General Houston's army over the Brazos river. It was loaded at the time with cotton for McKinney & Williams at Quintana.

Hon. Harry Haynes of Brenham, a native of Washington county and well informed in the history of this subject, wrote the Galveston News recently as follows:

"There is some excellent authority for the statement that the navigation of the Brazos was commenced as early as 1833. The first boats to ascend the river were small and rudely constructed craft, but many successful trips at irregular intervals were made for several years. Oregon and Judge McLean, steam packets, drawing seven or eight feet of water, with two masts and a speed of ten or twelve miles an hour were put on the river early in the '40s, and plied regularly between Velasco and Columbia, making occasional trips to Richmond and some verseco and Columbia, making occasional trips to richmond and some times going as high as San Felipe. The capacity of these vessels was very large at the time, and in making trips on the river they often used both steam and sails. In 1842 the Mustang was put on the river, and on its first trip went as high as Washington, conveying a number of passengers and a good lot of merchaodise. The Mustang on this and other trips demonstrated the entire practicability of successfully navigating the river, which led to the formation of a joint stock company. gating the river, which led to the formation of a joint stock company in Washington, in 1844, with some Galveston capitalists as members, for the purpose of building a line of packets for use expressly and permanently on the river. This company had ample capital, and sent for two vessels, the Washington and the Brazos, which did service on the river for many years. The capacity of the Washington was 800 bales of cotton, and was commanded by Captain Hatfield. The capacity of the Brazos was 700 bales, commanded by Captain Bretlinger. The Brazos made her last trip April 15, 1857, and besides other freight carried 595 bales of cotton from Washington to Galveston, making the trip in good time without accident or adventure. The steamers that did service on the upper Brazos from 1842 to 1858 were the Mustang, Brazos, Washington, Elite, Lady Byron, Fort Henry, Bell Sulphur, Buffalo, Yellowstone, Jack Hays, Samuel M. Williams and possibly others. The Fort Henry was a magnificent packet, but the Samuel M. Williams named in honor of the accomplished. Williams, named in honor of the accomplished secretary of Austin's colony, was the largest, best equipped and most elegant vessel that has ever done service on this stream. All the above named vessels except the last two made regular trips to Port Sullivan, sixty miles above Washington, three hundred and fifteen miles from the mouth of the river, and sometimes, under favorable circumstances, ascended the river to Waco. Two vessels ran up to Bolivar in 1863, but the navigation of the river was practically abandoned in 1859 and 1860, not owing to the formation of bars and other obstructions in the river, as has been repeatedly stated by persons discussing this subject, but owing to the completion of the Houston and Texas Central railroad from Houston to Hempstead, thence up the river to Navasota, and later to Bryan, being the first road of importance to penetrate the interior. True, bars and other obstructions have formed since, to remove which it will require both money and engineering skill, but the enthusiasm of the people over the advent of the first railroad was almost limitless and boundless, and in the midst of this enthusiasm the attention of shippers was diverted from the river to the railroad, from which time! its disuse may be disted. The steamboat owners seem to have caught up the railroad excitement and made no sort of fight to maintain their business, but quietly took their boats out of the river, leaving the railroad master of the transportation situation."

How. Guy M. Bryan, a resident of Texas since 1831, in a recent interview shid. About fifty years ago I was a delegate from Brazoria county to a convention that met in the flown of Washington on the Brizos Tiver. The object of said convention was to take the preliminary steps for the improvement of the Brazos river and the placing of steam-boats, therefore, for the removal of arops, Two of the active members of that convention I recollect to have been Dr. J. relatives in Portsmouth, O., who had steamboat interests on that river. Through Dr. Peebles mainly arrangements were made to place two boats upon the Brazos. The boats were called the Washington and Brazos, and for several years they navigated that river for parts of the river, taking off the crops. They sometimes went as high as Sutberlands Bluffs, and brought the cotton down to the mouth of the Brazos, and from there it was taken by boats to Galveston. Again, when Texas sold her New Mexican territory to the United States, a portion of the money was appropriated by the legislature to the improvement of the river—a small portion of it. I was then in the legislature from Brazoria and Fort Bend counties. Judge Gustavus Cook was at that time judge of Fort Bend county; he and I secured a skiff at Richmond and hired two men to row the boat, and he and I sounded the river from Richmond to tide water. We found a number of mud and sand bars, with deep pools of water above them, and in every instance we found that these bars seemed to be formed by snags and salt weeds being fastened to the bottom of the river, around which the debris is held by the water connected. I kept notice of the water, one writing down and the other sounding."

In 1874 Captain R. B. Talfor of the United States engineering corps made an examination of the Brazos river from Waco down to Richmond. This was in pursuance of an act of congress and an appropriation, at the instance of Hon. D. C. Giddings of Brenham, the member of congress from this district. This was the first appropriation made for the Brazos river by congress. In closing his report to the chief of engineers, Captain Talfor says: "During a conversation with Captain William Jenkins of the steamboat George W. Thomas, who was one of the first pilots who navigated the river from its mouth to Washington, a distance of 225 miles, he informed me that if the bridges that now spanned the river were such that he could take a boat through, and if some of the snags that have accumulated since the closing of navigation were removed, he would again run his boats to those points on the river from which he is now excluded as long as the stage of water in the river would permit, which would be on an average about eight months in the year. From personal observation I think that the navigation of the Brazos to Washington can be accomplished at a stage of river at, say, one-third banks full; to Richmond and San Felipe at even a less stage of water, but as to the duration of the above stages of water am not informed, as the information on this subject is very con-

Everyone on the lower Brazos knew old Captain Bill Jenkins, and no man was better able to form an opinion on this subject. In 1890 the Waco board of trade caused a survey of the Brazos river to be made from Waco to Richmond by Prof. J. H. Hurwood, an accomplished civil engineer. In this report Prof. Hurwood says: "Of the 416 miles of river between Waco and Richmond, 398.10 miles are pools. The Brazos river does not descend to the sea in a gradual slope; it is, as far as San Felipe, a series of elongated lakes, or canals, or pools, rising one above the other from San Felipe to Waco. These lakes or pools vary in length from one-fourth mile for the smallest to eighty-four miles the longest. Below San Felipe the lake system of the river is not so well defined, but sufficiently so as to class as pools, being uniformly deep water. The Brazos, in respect to its long and deep lake system, is a remarkable river. It has forty-four lakes, the channels of which constitute natural canals. The shoals and rapids, also forty-four in number, fitted with locks and dams, should make slack water navigation from Richmond to Waco possible every month in the year except high water. As a summary, the Brazos during our measurement contained from Waco to Richmond, in round numbers, 398 miles of water practicable for light draft boating and sixteen miles of shoals and rapids."

The above referred to reports of Captain Talfor and Prof. Hurwood were published in full by the Velasco board of trade in pamphlet form in 1894 in connection with a letter from the distinguished civil

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l Prof. Hurwood de in pamphlet stinguished civil engineer from Detroit, Mich., Mr. Geo. Y. Wisner, in which letter Mr. Wisner, after discussing the problem of the navigation of the Brazos from Velasco, based on the two surveys made by Captain Talfor and Prof. Hurwood, and his own knowledge of the river for several years when in charge of the construction of the jetties of the Brazos river at its mouth, said: "In conclusion I wish to state that in my opinion a permanent low water channel with a minimum depth of not less than four feet may be made from Waco to tide water."

The Brazos delegation have a few of the pamphlets and those who wish to read the reports of the engineers and Mr. Wisner's discussion of them will be furnished with a copy. The legislature of Texas thought the Brazos could be made navigable in 1856 and made an appropriation therefor (and for other streams.) And the last legislature passed a joint resolution asking that congress make the necessary appropriations to open up the river to Waco.

The Kanawha river in West Virginia, a mountain stream, was made navigable by a system of locks and dams to give an outlet for their coal and iron. Millions of dollars have been and are spent every year for levees and other improvements on the Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio and other rivers in the United States, at places more difficult of improvements than the Brazos river.

Hon. Guy M. Bryan in the interview referred to said: "About three years ago I spent a part of the summer on the Ohio river in Pennsylvania, about twenty miles below Pittsburg. There where I was was an extensive work for the improvement of the Ohio river by the United States government. I examined these works, which consisted of a dam from one side of the river to the other, where there was a lock through which steamboats passed at low stages of the water. The Monongahela river is dammed in the same way, and navigation made for 150 miles, as I was informed, and the harbor of Pittsburg is made by dams on that river."

In 1895 Lieutenant Wilson of the United States engineers after a careful survey of the river from Richmond down reported it easily succeptible of improvement at a small cost. The last congress appropriated \$65,000 to be used in improving the Brazos and other streams, out of which a dredge is to be constructed; and the chief of engineers has recently recommended that \$150,000 be appropriated by next congress. The government has taken charge of the harbor at the mouth of the river and the jetty works there which cost private parties over \$1,000,000 has been given to the government. The last congress appropriated \$85,000 for work on the jettles and channel and it is supposed this will put not less than a 20-foot channel there. The chief of engineers has recommended that the next congress appropriate \$165,000 for the further extension of the jetties. I have with me a written opinion of Mr. G. Y. Wisner; the engineer who built the present jetties, that 30 feet of water can be obtained at the mouth of the Brazos river for \$1,375,000.

The three great dailies of Texas—The Galveston-Dallas News and Houston Post—have indorsed the opinion of the Brazos for navigation.

Why should we not ask the general government to give us that which is justly ours?

We now come to the second proposition, viz: "The Brazos river can be made navigable from Velasco to Waco at a reasonable cost."

The distance from Velasco to Waco by water, according to Prof. Hurwood, is 518 miles. What, then, is a reasonable cost to make this a navigable channel for 518 miles through one of the most fertile valleys in the world.

Prof. Hurwood estimated that the shoals and bars can be dredged and snags removed so as to make a navigable channel to Waco at a cost of \$580,000. Mr. Wisner, with whom Prof. Hurwood and government engineers seem to concur, thinks that there should be a system of locks and dams adopted for overcoming the shoals and rapids. He also calls attention to the fact that there is a wide difference between the conditions reported by Captain Talfor and Prof. Hurwood in their respective surveys. and after giving his views on the proper system to adopt (of locks and dams) Mr. Wisner says: "If the physical conditions. given in Prof. Hurwood's reports are those actually existing at the low water stage of the river, I would be willing to enter into a contract to obtain a permanent low water channel with minimum depth of not less than four feet from Waco to tide water (above' Velasco) for the sum of \$1,500,000, the payment for the same to be due and payable when the regular channel is completed respectively to Richmond, Washington, Port Sullivan and Waco, proportionate to amount of work on each section. If the obstacles to be overcome are as great as indicated by the report of Captain Talfor it would not, be safe to make a contract as above outlined for less than \$2,500,000." And after expressing the opinion that an accurate survey should be made of each shoal or rapid so that a contractor would know exactly; what was to be done, Mr. Wisner concludes as follows: "After: such an examination as outlined above a contract could probably he made for the successful completion of such a channel (four feet in. depth) for an amount much less than that given above based on the. data now at our disposal."

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We have two plans or methods suggested by two different engineers, and two estimates ranging from \$580,000 to \$2,500,000.

This brings us to the third proposition which is "that the benefit to the public resulting from the necessary expenditure will justify the government in making that expenditure."

Speaking broadly the state of Texas is divided into three great; divisions or belts running north and south. The eastern portion-is, timbered land, the middle is agricultural, and the western portion is pastoral. The Brazos river cuits through the agricultural portion of Texas: The twelve countles fronting on the river from Waco to: Velasco are McLennau, Falls, Milam, Roberson, Brazos, Grimes, Burleson, Washington, Austin, Waller, Fort Bend and Brazoria, and, have a combined area of 9851; square miles. The entire state has about 270,000 square miles. The assessed value of these twelvecount'es for 1899 is \$80,117,000. The total population of the state, according to the general of 1890, was 2.235,523 and the population of the twelve counties named was 242,279. So it will be seen that the twelve counties with one-thirtieth of the territory of the state furnished one-tenth of its wealth and population! In 1897, when the board of engineers provided by congress to inquire into the advisability; of the government taking charge of the port at the mouth of the Brasos, were at Velasco; Hong L. L. Poster now presiing to Prof. est to make most fertile

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dent of the agricultural and mechanical college and formerly one of the railroad commissioners and then in charge of the Velasco companies' interests, compiled important statistics bearing on this subject and submitted them to the board. Mr. Foster showed that the twelve counties named raised 425,342 bales of cotton in 1894 valued at \$9,773,468, and corn, oats, sugar, hay and wool valued at \$5,360,422. Mr. Foster's main argument in favor of the government taking charge of the port was that the river should be open to navigation, and in a written statement made to the board of engineers he said in part: "The Brazos river penetrates the heart of the agricultural region of Texas. Lying along its banks and for many miles distant is the richest, and most fertile soil to be found anywhere in the United States. The output of agricultural products in the territory alluded to is enormous. The effect of opening the harbor to the mouth of the Brazos river on rail rates would be to materially reduce them at all points reached by navigable waters. Barges drawing from two to four feet could be floated down the river from points 250 miles distant from its mouth; with a comparatively small expenditure in river improvement a much greater distance. The mouth of the Brazos is the only point in Texas where the opening of the harbor capable of accommodating vessels of twenty feet draft or more would result in any material reduction in the rates and charges to and from gulf ports in the state, for the reason that it is the only port into which flows a navigable stream or a stream capable of being made navigable for any considerable distance. No reduction in railroad charges to seaboard from Texas followed the opening of a deep water harbor at Galveston, nor will any such results follow the opening of any other port on the Texas coast except at Velasco. The effect of opening said port and river as far as it may become navigable on the rates of freight charged is illustrated by its effect on such charges from points where the river is now navigable. The railroad commission rates on cotton in bales is 43 cents for 100 pounds, or \$2.15 per bale of 500 pounds for a distance of 100 miles. Columbia, a point on the Brazos river 100 miles from Galveston, can reach Galveston by both rail and water transportation. Cotton is carried from this point by water for 20 cents per 100 pounds, or \$1 per bale of 500 pounds. Velasco, on the Brazos river, also has rail and water transportation to Galveston. The distance from Velasco to Galveston by rail is 100 miles, and the railroad commission rate on cotton for that distance? between all points in Texas not affected by water transportation is \$2.25 per bale of 500 pounds. But the water lines carry a 500 pound bale of cotton from Velasco to Galveston for 80 cents, and the rail-road lines must do likewise of surrender the business to the water carriers. There is therefore \$1.15 saved to the producer on every bale for the producer of the producer on every bale on the producer of the producer on every bale on the producer of the producer of the producer on every bale on the producer of the produc of cotton shipped from Columbia to Galveston, and \$1.45 per bale on all shipments to the same point, as compared to the railroad commission rates for the like distance, by reason of water competitions. Fifteen thousand bales of cotton were produced in Brazoria county in. 1896, on every bale of which the producer saved between \$1 and \$1.25 per bale in freight charges on account of its proximity to the navigable part of the Brazes river. "The influence of the Brazes river on freight rates is felt as far north as Richmond, a distance of: about 100 miles from its mouth, though there is no actual shipping, from that point down the river. Cotton may, however, be hauled down the river and shipped by water to the gulf. The distance by rail from Richmond to Galveston is sixty four miles, and the railroad commission rate on cotton for that distance is \$1.45 per bale of 500 pounds; but by reason of water competition it is necessary for the railroad companies to earry it for 75 cents per bale. The railroad. commission rate on a 500 pound, bale of cotton from Waco to Galveston, a distance of 236 miles, is \$3.25. From Brenham to Galveston, a distance of 122 miles, it is \$1.25 per bale. The opening of the Brazosa river to navigation by barges as far north as Brenham, where there is little, if anyighout of its practicability, would materially reduce-freight rates to all points north as far as. Waco and to all points west of the siver whates to the guid would then be made by adding the

rail rate from the point of origin to the head of navigation on the river, and the water rate thence to the gulf together, the combination forming the through rate to the gulf. By making the river navigable from tidewater to Waco, a sum not less than \$1,000,000 per. year would be saved to the people of the Brazos valley from Waco south in freight charges, and rates to all points in north Texas would be reduced more or less according to distance from Waco. It is not necessary for commerce to actually move along a certain route for that route to exercise a controlling influence on freight rates. The Mississippi river well illustrates this point. Though only a very small part of the commerce of the Mississippi valley now finds its way to market on the bosom of the Father of Waters, there is not a pound of freight originating near it or that crosses it on its destination to or from market, upon the charges on which it does not exercise either a controlling or modifying influence. So it will be with the Brazos river of Texas. It would be the greatest factor in the state in the regulation and control of freight charges, and there is no part of Texas that would not feel its beneficial effects were it open to navigation even as far north as the Houston and Texas Central railroad crossing near the town of Brenham. I do not hesitate to express the opinion that the saving in freight charges compared to present rates on cotton, cottonseed products, lumber and other commodities, that would be affected within a period of three years, would pay all expenses necessary to obtain a twenty foot channel to the sea, and open the river to barge transportation as far north as the crossing of the Houston and Texas Central road, about 250 miles from its mouth. Within that distance the following railroads cross the river: Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe; New York, Texas and Mexican; San Antonio and Aransas Pass; Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio (Southern Pacific); Missouri, Kansas and Texas; Texas Western, and Houston and Texas Central. The freight charges on cotton and other like commodities on all of these lines would be materially affected by opening the river to navigation as above suggested. The cotton and other commodities would not all go to market by water, but would be moved by the rail lines by rates fixed by the water route. I do not believe that the people of Texas, and particularly of the upper Brazos valley, have ever fully comprehended the meaning and effect of the opening of the Brazos river to navigation as far as it is practicable, though from the earliest period of Texas history the Brazos river has, by common consent, been regarded as susceptible of navigation for a considerable distance from its mouth. This opinion found expression in an act of the legislature of 1858, appropriating \$60,000 for its improvement, and also subsequently at various periods down to the present time in resolutions of boards of trade, memorials, petitious, etc., to the legislature of the state and to congress, requesting an appropriation for its improvement."

It can be safely stated that there are 500,000 bales of cotton raised annually in the twelve counties above named. It will be seen that Mr. Foster thought that \$1,000,000 per year could be saved to the people of the Brazos valley from Waco south by making the river navigable for barges. It would be a conservative estimate to place the saving of freight on cotton alone at \$1 per bale, or \$500,000 per annum. In order to get at the amount of freight handled by the railroads in the twelve countles, I addressed a letter to Hon. John H. Reagan, chairman of the state railroad commission asking for that information, and received the following reply: "In regard to your inquiries of the 16th inst, you are respectfully advised that this commission has not with its limited clerical force, undertaken to keep account of the tonnage transported into and out of the several counties of this state, but using a mileage basis, we believe we can roughly approximate the amount for the twelve counties you name. In these counties there are 903.81 miles of railroad exclusive of yard tracks and sidings. Four roads, aggregating 100.31 miles are situated wholly within the boundaries of that belt of counties, and during the year. ending June 30, 1898, these four roads handled 189,292 tous of freight

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

The following named heirs or divisees accounting in the final division of my estate for the amounts they have severally received already that is: my daughter Fanny through her first husband Peyton S. Wyatt, twenty two hundred and forty dollars eighty two cents, William Routt Jr, Seventeen hundred and thirty dollars, Spelman C. Routt, two thousand dollars; said Spelman C. Routt having died leaving one son who is heir to said Spelman C. Routt's two thousand dollars. I do not wish said grandson to have any of my estate. Joseph W. Routt, Seventeen hundred and fifty dollars, said amounts severally received to bear no interest.

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

IMPERIAL CAKE.

Gateau à l'Impériale.

Whip twelve whole eggs, one pound of castor-sugar and two ounces of vanilla sugar over boiling water until the mixture is warm, then remove it from the fire, and whip it until cold and thick; add twelve ounces of finely sifted flour, four ounces of finely chopped desiccated cocoanut, and mix well; then divide the mixture into three parts; color one part with carmine, and flavor it with six or eight drops of essence of almonds; color the second portion with sap-green, and flavor it with essence of lemon, and leave the third portion white; sprinkle over each a little more cocoanut, place each portion separately in a saute-pan or round baking-tin about eight inches wide by two inches deep. and bake in a moderate oven for about one half hour; when cooked, turn out, and leave until cold, then cut each into two slices horizontally, spread a layer of Vienna icing flavored with chocolate over each of the red-colored portions, arrange a layer of Vienna icing over the green-colored portions and a layer of rose-colored Vienna icing over the white parts; then place each slice of the



cake one on top of the other, arrange the different colors effectively. Prepare a paste bottom about one inch thick and the same size as the cake, and bake it until a nice golden color; then place the prepared cakes in this, glaze it with maraschino glace, and leave it until set; then by means of a forcing-bag and rose and plain pipes ornament the top and sides, as in the engraving, with Vienna icing and rose-colored Vienna icing, and put it aside until the next day to dry. Dish up on a round silver dish on a gold or silver dessert-paper, and serve for a ball supper or afternoon party, etc.

ANGEL'S-FOOD.

11 eggs, the whites, 11/2 cupfuls of sifted powdered sugar, 1 teaspoonful of vanilla,

1 teaspoonful of cream of tartar,

A pinch of salt.

Sift the flour, cream of 'arts', sugar and salt together four or five times; beat the eggs in a large platter to a stiff froth, then add the sifted flour gradually on the platter with the eggs. Don't let it stand a minute after it is thoroughly mixed; bake forty minutes in a moderate oven. Try it with a straw, and if not done, let it bake a few minutes longer. Do not open the oven door until the cake has been in the oven fifteen minutes.



THE HOUSE OF CEDAR Isaac Applewhite - Spencer Home

This home is built on a Spanish grant of land given to William Munson before 1836. Much of Chappell Hill is in the Munson League.

It was not until 1852 that Applewhite came from Osyka, Mississippi, and purchased this site from Jacob Haller. Haller had purchased enough of this league and others to lay out the town of Chappell Hill. Applewhite sold this home in 1854 to Ben R. Thomas, who lived here until 1859, then sold to Charlotte Hargrove. After owning it a year she sold to A.M. Box. It changed hands six more times before 1881 when Sue Routt Williams bought it and used it as a homestead until 1889, when it was sold to Dr. Paul M. Raysor. Local people remember when the Ben Smalls lived here in the early 1900's, then sold to Miss Nanny and Miss Fanny Adams, who in turn sold to Harry K. Lesser, owners just prior to the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. J.S. Spencer.

Isaac Applewhite was a minister, lawyer, and teacher with a hobby of carpentry. When he found himself here in the midst of so much native cedar, he built the home of which he had always dreamed, "The House of Cedar".

The house is very simple in construction, with Early Victorian influence on the outside. The front gallery has the typical gingerbread trim. Each small spindle around the top of the gallery is hand-turned and mounted on a dowel. The beams are all hand-hewn and pegged. Square nails were used throughout the house.

The interior is constructed with the simplest of designs, of country house type, with no trim around doors or windows. The original floors throughout the house are of thick cedar. The dining-room floor had to be replaced with pine as cedar in the same thickness was not available. The use of nine panes over six, in the windows was not uncommon, but through the years many have been replaced by custom-made modern windows when necessary.

While the present owners are not collectors of antiques, there is a good sample of family pieces belonging to the Victorian era.

The Spencers purchased this house for a country home in 1958. Many week-ends were spent working on the house, remodelling in a manner that was in keeping with Mr. Applewhite of 1852. Since 1964 the Spencer family has deserted the city and moved to Chappell Hill permanently.

Fr. Applowhite, bern in 1816, was buried in Brenham in 1907. Mrs. Ruby Rebertson of Brenham is a granddaughter of Applewhite and Mr. Sidney Applewhite of New Wehdem is his grandson.

I have looked into the matter of Title to the lands set out in a Deed from J. S.SMITH and J. E. ROUTT to you. This Deed is yet to be acknowledged.

From the field notes given in your deed I find that the Title comes down through 2 separate pieces of property.

One piece supposed to be about an acre, and the other piece about 10-1/2 acres. The 10-1/2 acres, I have started with a Deed from M. M. Felder and wife to Mattie T. Hudgins, dated Jan. 16,1899, as set out in Vol. 39 page 511. This deed seems to be allright and Mrs. Hudgins later conveys said property for all cash to the trustees of Chappell Hill Female College.

There is a Deed of Trust to J. A. Small for B. F. Small for \$1800.00, and set out in Vol. J. pg 93. This, I find no Release for. This, however, covers the one acre, I presume, yet from the descriptions given, it is hard to tell just where this one acre lies, as the boundaries are mentioned giving different individuals names and calling for a street called Church Street. There is no map of Chappell Hill on record, and therefore it is some guess work from a record stand point, however, I think this is covered by your land or at least a portion of it.

I find a Deed on record dated Sept. 26, 1913, from the Chappell Hill Female College to J. S. Smith and J. E. Routt, in which said deed is conveyed all of the property belonging to the Chappell Hill Female College, in which said deed they assume an indebtedness of \$5500.00. This bears date Sept. 26, 1913.

I find that since Sept. 25, 1913 there has been two releases filed for record, both dated Dec. 18, 1913, which as shown is a later date than the deed to these gentlemen, Smith and Routt. The two Releases show payment of \$1200.00 to Giddings and \$3166.25 to R. K. Felder et al and while there is nothing to show positively that these payments were made by Smith and Routt and is apart or all of the assumed indebtedness of \$5500.00 yet I suppose that such is the case. Would suggest that Mr. Routt or Mr. Smith, either or both of them make an affidavit or statement showing that these two Releases were really settled by them, and that they have paid out the entire indebtedness of \$5500.00, which I am satisfied they have done, but it is not plainly shown on record. Therefore, the above suggestion, for record.

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The Chappell Hill Female College semms to have bought the one acre from Jacob Heller, this is mentioned in the Deed of Trust executed by the College in 1895, and taking this statement as true. I have made no search for said Deed.

You can satisfy yourself as to any taxes due on this property by inquiring at the Tax Collector's office.

The Release given by the Farmer's State Bank should be signed by J. J. Shaver, who was trustee in said Deed of Trust, and as he is in Chappell Hill, it will be very little trouble for him to sign and acknowledge this Release.

This Release, spoken of properly signed and acknowledged and rerecorded and a statement in reference to the \$5500.00 indebtedness assumed, and no back taxes on said land, I see no reason at this time why you cannot take Title to said property described in your Deed.

This, however, covers time only, as above set out in this letter.

As above stated there is no map of record of Chappell Hill and in running through this matter. I find that the Trustees in one place in executing a deed of trust and describing the lands calls the one acre on College Street and in the Deed from Routt and Smith the Street calls for is called Church Street. I presume, they are the same. This he you can find out from some of the parties in Chappell Hill that know these names, and if you find the Street called by both names it amounts to nothing and of no effect, except that it is comfusing.

They said the cyclone which passed thru some 10 or 15 years ago did it, and that the other obslish was put back, but was so unstacky feared it would fall on one of the children, so they toppled it over again. The grayeyard lies on the east side of he wase, on its left side, and loubtless mes once a flower garden. The woman living here told us that they had lowed into bricks laid in the chare of a flower bed.

the said had been told that he killed two of the wives; the same cyclone swept the second stroy from the front of the house, so they took the useless stair case and made front and mack porch steps of it; one one told they they were treading on stairs which had seen murder done—that he pushed the one with the young beby down them and killed her in that fashion. I had forgotten just what you had written so wasn't ble to talk with her very intelligently or might have gotten more confirmation; she said he had a falling out with some one and they started to "cut it out" but instead shut themselves up in a foom and "shot it out." Born Feb 22, 1820 died Septl 10, 1854 aged 35 years 7 months and 12 days. (Ellis' midule initial broken off. Do you suppose he was instrumental in her passing also? Wasn(t so long after her demise he departed for Texas. I just wonder....)

Well -- I went and gave the house a good look for your sake. It was build of old brick, with the 4 brick thick walls, Crusader's Cross doors, a chairboard round the walls, and plaster directly on the brick. The fireplaces, are, of course, enormous. and the mantels were once pretty but have been painted a peculiar shadecross between old rose and cerase: The Bank has also painted the exterior red and added a frame kitchen. They said was once a covered porch to a log house, which was, I assume the kitchen. I don't know how high the second story in front, which was blown off, was, but that left on the back room is a gable room only. The mantels were reeded -- Sheraton influence, isn't it? The floors, of course, are the wide hand hewn plank. (I guess you know what a chairboard is-all these old houses have them-a piece of molding about the wall at the height of the back of a straight chair. Used them so often, even if no penelling. The woodwork in this house looks much like that in out home which I know was built in 1825. I am not much of an artist but will try to do a little sketching for you. Find that details didn't register so well-I haven't at all a retentive memory as regards things seen. Too I got such a shock. he woman living there was awfully nice to invite me in to show me he house, so I was trailing her thru-started in back room, and went thru to east room to show marks in walls where stairs used to be-and there lying on bed was an old, old woman that I thought at first glance was a corpse--and wouldn't be at all sure yet she wasn't except her eyes were open! But hadn't a gleam in them, so I suppose was still alive, yet dead. The woman didn't mention her and I didn't either but gave me "quite a turn!" The house was badly injured in the storm, and the plaster cracked off the walls in many places. Wish the brick could talk -- doubtless they could a tale unfold?

Well--maybe some day I'll get on the Blackburn trail and have better luck. But I'd never been satisfied if I hadn't gone over this place thoroughly. If I had the opportunity I'd like to go over that lot with a sexton's rod and see if there aren't other graves there. But maybe its just as well I can't else might be tempted to disinter

them on the off chance of a coffin plate!

You asked about the Wilburns. The Wellborns here are from one Isaac Wellborn of North Carolina (originally Virginia (antedating the much publicized Filgrim fathers by several years) The Wilburns are from Dinwiddie, I assume as tax records show, I enclose a copy of our data, which I think is all we have. Mrs Chas Gerber of Cordova, -enn is a descendant and may have worked this line.

It is getting late and time to bed my infants down so I'll copy it and quit. Write more later maybe -- if I get the chance to find anything. Deems to me I can't get anything you really want.

Hope things out there are going along nicely. We need rain here, after the daily floods of March. Ground is so dry the seed can't germinate.

THE LOCKHART PLANTATION - SCOTTLAND FARMS MANOR HOUSE

John Washington Lockhart came to Texas from Alabama at the age of 16 with his family which settled at Washington-on-the Brazos. After schooling at Tulane University and graduation from Louisville Medical College, he practiced medicine in Chappell Hill. He bought 1000 acres of land in 1848 and on it built THE LOCKHART HOUSE, two years later, in 1850.

This charming structure, a story and a half building, was constructed of cedar, ash, and walnut cut on the plantation. It has fluted pillars and old fashioned dormer windows and was one of the first plastered houses in rural Texas. It stands today, as it did when built except that the shed kitchen was incorporated into the house in 1910. The present tack house was a combination commissary, wash house, and quarters for a house servant. The slave quarters were located on an elliptical lane which lay on the north side of the house. This area was cutlined by rose bushes and shrubs as late as 1910.


The Lockhart family lived here until 1895 when they moved to Galveston where their son, William Browning Lockhart, the son-in-law of Col. Walter Gresham, was a practicing attorney. Colonel Gresham had built and was living in the "Bishop's Palace", famous Galveston landmark.

The great hurricane of September 1900 sent the family hurriedly home to Chappell Hill where the driven rain had ruined the plaster of the old mansion. Dr. Lockhart died a month later from the shock of the storm. He was buried in the Atkinson Cemetery two miles west of Chappell Hill, where today he lies with his family and relatives in a beautiful setting which is assured by an endowment by his grandson, Joseph Edmund Wallis, and others.

The old plantation remained the possission of the Lockhart family until 1961 when Dr. and Mrs. Russell Scott, Jr. of Houston purchased it.

The Scott's immediately began a program of reclamation of both the soil and the buildings. The old home has been renovated but no attempt has been made to "restore" it to its ante-bellum condition, emphasis rather being made to create a comfortable country home of the present time but with the patina of the past.



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

She was a graduate of the old Chapel Hill Female College, which later merged with Southern Methodist University.



THE SLEDGE - STOCKDALE HOUSE

This Greek Revival antebellum house, on one of the most beautiful sites in Washington County, was built about 1850, of native cedar, stone, and heart of pine, with hand-hewn cedar sills. Wooden pegs and square nails were used throughout. Ceilings are nearly twelve feet high. Windows have the rare nine over six lights.

The three fireplaces are of native stone and hand-made bricks, probably done by slaves. The double front doors, with leaded glass and side lights, open into the reception hall which lends the interior an air of gracious hospitality.

Colonel William Sledge from Tennessee was the contractor-builder of the pre-Civil War Washington County Railroad which crossed the Brazos River east of Chappell Hill. He mortgaged half of his coming years cotton crop to build the railroad bridge over the Brazos.

The Stockdales purchased this gracious home in 1966 and have been most active in its preservation and restoration since. The interior decoration is in keeping with the period and is most attractive. Most of the work has been done by the Stockdales themselves.

One recent owner moved the old kitchen and dining room to the back of the yard. These rooms are now being converted into a pleasant guest house.

Special items of interest:

In the east bed-room there is a beautiful walmut, half-tester bed with blue velvet upholstered canopy, and accompanying bed-steps.

Throughout the house are many items of oriental design collected by the Stockdales in their travels, such as the carved camphor-wood chest in the hall and the carved teakwood table.

In the dining room, note the kerosene hanging lamp, and the walmut cupboard originally in this house and built about 1850. One end of this cupboard is rough-hewn as that end was intended for a corner.

The clock on the mantel-piece of the living-room has been in Mrs. Stockdale's family for 125 years.

Note the arched cornices on doors and windows, and the heart of pine floors.





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
