WHO THE GERMAN BOYS ARE? THE MILDNESS OF RECENT YELLOW FEVER SUGGESTS THE DETERIORATION OF GERM.

SCIENCE KNOWS HOW IT BEHAVES. And the Disease Can Be Controlled. Quarantining of Cities Soon to Be Abandoned.

IN the comment upon the reports of asymptomatic cases and of yellow fever at Houston, New Orleans and elsewhere last year and this season, a great many laymen and physicians have frequently asserted that if these so-called cases of yellow fever were really what they were called, the disease must have lost its malignity, and was not to be feared as was the type of the disease known twenty or thirty years ago.

Some time previous to the report of a suspicious case at Port Harlan last year, a reporter for The News was discussing with Dr. Allen J. Smith, bacteriologist of the medical department of the university of Texas, the fact of the mildness of the disease and the light mortality among the United States troops at Santiago. This led to some comment upon the yellow fever at New Orleans last year and the eight cases reported by Dr. John Guiteras at Cavoyan in October, 1887, which suggested that in view of the light mortality and the mildness of the disease at all these places, it appeared to him as a layman that the disease had lost something of its virulence and ought no longer to be greatly feared.

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GEN. BLANCO'S BIG SCHEME

HAD PLANNED TO FORM A SPANISH-AMERICAN REPUBLIC IN THE WEST INDIES.

EARLY SURRENDER DEFEATED HIM

Whether He Was in Continuance With Suggestive of Acting Treacherously is Not Known.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 21.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: A story of a sensational nature comes from apparently reliable sources claiming a plot formed in Havana by the leading Spaniards, including Captain General Blanco, to overthrow the Spanish government and form an independent Spanish republic in Cuba, which would eventually divert to Spain, thus securing and retaining the mark of that country. The scheme was secretly laid out, the preliminary steps being taken toward carrying it into effect.
